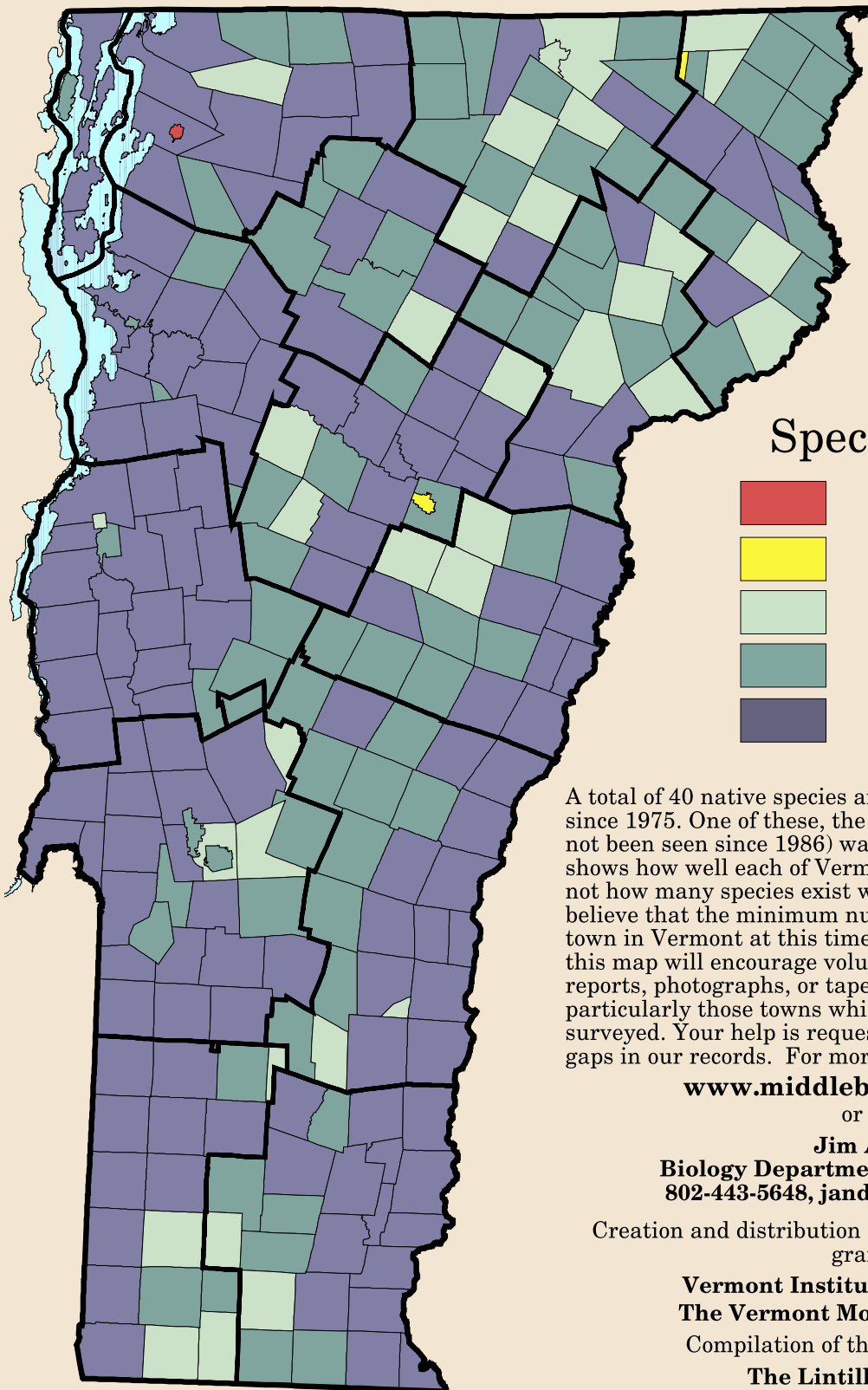







Vermont Reptile and Amphibian Atlas

Species Reported

	0 - 2	No significant survey effort
	3 - 6	A few common species reported
	7 - 10	Some common species reported
	11 - 14	Many common species reported
	15 +	Most common species reported

A total of 40 native species are known to have bred in Vermont since 1975. One of these, the Western Chorus Frog (which had not been seen since 1986) was rediscovered in 1998. This map shows how well each of Vermont's towns have been surveyed, not how many species exist within the town's boundaries. We believe that the minimum number of species present in any town in Vermont at this time is approximately 15. Hopefully this map will encourage volunteers to contribute written reports, photographs, or tape recordings from all towns, particularly those towns which have not been adequately surveyed.
