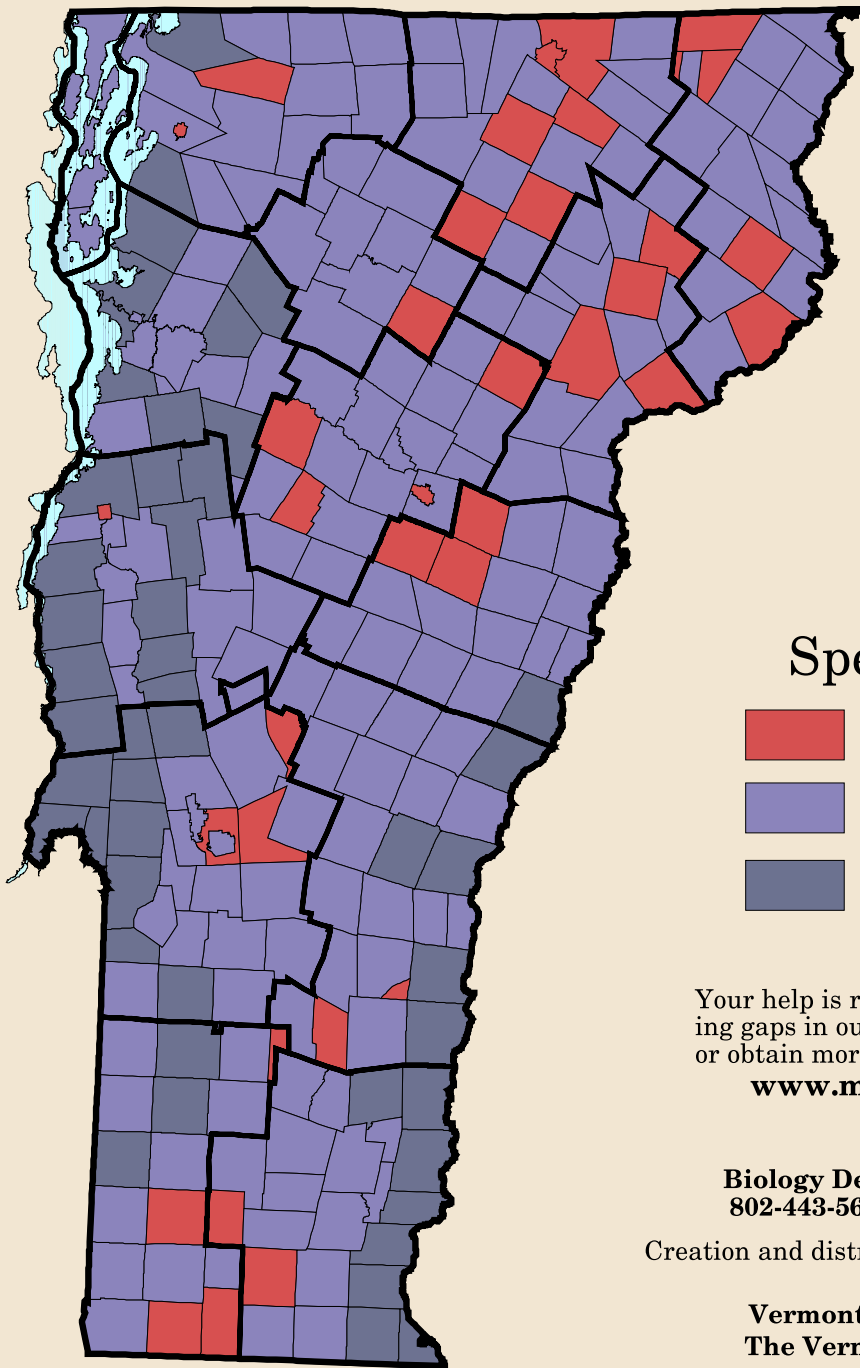


# WANTED
